## School Uniform Policy

At Tarvin Primary School, we believe that it is important for children to wear uniform. School uniforms are important for a variety of reasons: They reduce competition and peer pressure among students, they help keep the focus on education as opposed to fashion choices, and they reduce clothing expenses for all parents. Uniforms also encourage a sense of school pride and tradition in students.

### School Uniform

- Grey tailored trousers/ shorts/ skirt/ dress
- Pale blue polo shirt (available with school badge)
- Appropriate, black school footwear (not trainers or boots)
- Royal blue school sweatshirt or cardigan (available with school badge)
- Grey socks or tights
- Blue and white checked dress and white socks (optional, April - October)

### P. E. Uniform

- Plain (unbranded) royal blue t-shirt (available with school badge)
- Plain (unbranded) black shorts/ jogging bottoms/ leggings
- Plain (unbranded) royal blue hoodie (available with school badge)
- Trainers
- White socks

Hair should be smart, neat and tidy, and long hair should be tied back for P.E.

It is the parent/carer's responsibility to make sure that all clothing is marked clearly with their child's name.

### Jewellery

Jewellery, such as rings, bracelets or necklaces, should not be worn to school and, if children's ears have been pierced, only stud earrings should be worn. Wrist watches are allowed but must be removed for PE. This is an essential safety precaution.

Children should not wear any makeup in school.

### Affordability

### Religious/ cultural adaptations
